Dear Parishioners,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I would like to update you all in the progress of our five year Bicentennial Campaign.

To date, \$1,026,151.28 has been collected and \$267,973.69 has been pledged by the end of the five year effort which concludes in September of 2024. Although we have exceeded our initial goal of \$1.2 million dollars that was set four years ago, rising costs of materials, labor and overall inflationary pressures have raised the costs of our major church renovation to

the total amount of \$2.5 million dollars. 289 pledges were made out of 1255 currently registered families. If you have made a pledge, thank you for your gift. If you have not participated in this campaign thus far, I would like to invite you to reconsider as every dollar that you give will go directly towards this project benefiting the parish 100%. We have also 281 newly registered families in our parish since the campaign began four years ago and I will be reaching out to each of you with a personal letter for your participation in the very near future.

This major church renovation will include:

1/ The complete renovation of Founders Hall. (Completed in 2020)

2/ The creation of a new transept that will be built extending out from the wall where our Stations of the Cross are currently located increasing our seating capacity by approximately one hundred spaces and this will also

include a new washroom. This expanded space will provide more room for everyone including our music ministry that is currently participating by the St. Joseph Statue. (Commencing 2024)

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3/ An expanded narthex in the main entrance of the church which will increase our gathering space 300-400 %. This will enable us to use this new space for families preparing for funerals and weddings, catechesis for our children during our Sunday Masses, small receptions after Mass, an overflow area for more seating for Easter and Christmas, as well as a place for coffee and donuts and socializing after the Masses and all of this will be separate from the sacred space of the main church. This development will also include a drive through overhang extended across the church entrance to shield parishioners from the elements when they arrive and leave church. (Commencing 2024)

4/ A new sprinkler system for the entire church which is mandated for the safety of all and enforced by the local Fire Marshall. (Commencing 2024)

To date, Michael Walker has been hired by the parish and has completed the architectural design of our expansion plans. The Building & Renovation Advisory Committee (BRAC) from the Diocese of Charleston has approved all of our plans as well. We are now in the process of vetting three major contractors and choosing one who will execute the project. Once a contractor is chosen, hopefully in the next month or two, I will be able to share more with you in regards to when we will begin. There will be a time period where we will have to use the Parish Life Center for our weekday and Sunday Masses during our construction phase and we will do all we can to keep this to a minimum.

Next year will be a big year for our parish as we continue to grow as God's people.

Thank you for your prayers, support and generosity in contributing to the joy and blessings of our faith community.

Following a brief welcome, and prior to the golfers going out on the course, several First Responders (Pawleys Island Police and Firefighters from Midway Station #81) were recognized, honored, and thanked for their service as part of the 9/11 Program. Father Patrick J. Stenson said the opening prayer for the event and Father Paul MacNeil, the current Pastor, was on hand to offer his support. After the Pledge of Allegiance, Mr. Greg Lowery, U.S. Army Chorus, Retired, sang the National Anthem.

This year's event featured a speaker with a unique perspective to commemorate 9/11. Mr. Ferg Foley, a current PBOC parishioner, was the Deputy Trade Center Task Force Commander on site managing the Military Operations through the rescue and recovery phase. He was responsible for coordinating personnel and logistics with the Department pf Defense and other government agencies. His topic was "Never Forget" as he relayed his experiences of being at Ground Zero and the hope and patriotism that he witnessed in the aftermath of this horrific event in our nation's history.

After Mr. Foley finished his presentation, Mr. James Canty, played Taps on his trumpet. It was a powerful moment for everyone there and a great reminder of the patriotism that exists.

The morning program concluded with The Reserve Golf Director, Mr. Donald Clement, who went over the Rules of Play before sending the golfers onto the course. The golfers returned around 3:00pm and turned in their score cards to the golf pros to tabulate the low scoring teams. Prizes were awarded to the winning teams and door prizes donated by area businesses were given out to the raffle winners. Of course, the real winners will be the 14 Outreach Ministries at PBOC and the impact they will have on the people and community here in Pawleys Island and Georgetown County.

Pilgrimage to World Youth Day

Thirteen pilgrims from PBOC were blessed to have the opportunity to travel to World Youth Day (WYD) in Lisbon, Portugal this summer. We were part of a larger group of over fifty people from the Diocese of Charleston including Bishop Jacques Fabre-Jeune, Director of Vocations and USC chaplain Father Rhett Williams, and seminarians Erik Roman, Paul Sizemore, and our own Mark D'Angelo, and over a dozen pilgrims from St. Mary Our Lady of Ransom in Georgetown.



We flew into Toulouse, France on July 25 and traveled to nearby Lourdes. Here, in 1858, fourteen-year-old Bernadette Soubirous was visited multiple times by a lady in white in a grotto near the river. Just four years earlier Pope Pius IX had declared the dogma of the *Immaculate Conception* of Mary, a theological term not familiar to church laity. When Bernadette was urged by the local Priest to find out the name of the lady in white, she replied to her, "I am the *Immaculate Conception*." Church authorities were convinced that these apparitions were true and had a beautiful basilica built there. ¹

The next morning our group joined mass at the grotto celebrated by Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Archbishop of Westminster, UK. The Order of Malta brought many people suffering with illnesses to mass and to receive the healing waters of the grotto. That night we joined in a vigil with visitors from many nations on the grounds outside the church, including many of the sick helped along by caregivers, carrying candles, saying the rosary, and singing.

Over a century ago, Our Lady of Lourdes appeared to a poor child whose family was struggling to keep a roof over its head. Bernadette then pointed the world to the healing waters of the grotto where she appeared, and large crowds of people have been coming here ever since. For those who believe, no explanation is necessary. For those who do not believe, no explanation is possible. 2

The next day, we bussed to Burgos, Spain, and visited the magnificent Burgos Cathedral. Construction on the cathedral, known for its gothic architecture and artwork, began in 1221 and lasted over 300 years.3 Bishop Jacques celebrated mass for our group in a side chapel of this ancient church. One of the paths of the Camino de Santiago (The Way of St. James) passes through Burgos and leads on to Santiago de Compostela, the tomb of St. James the Greater, our destination the next day. 4

St. James is known for having spread Christianity to Spain in the early years of the Church before returning to Jerusalem. The book of Acts records the beheading of James, this first martyr of the Apostles. Followers of St. James from Spain transported his body back to the Iberian Peninsula and buried it there. Later, the ornate Cathedral of Santiago was built in that location and St. James' remains are entombed there. Pilgrims from all over the world continue to walk the Camino de Santiago ending at the cathedral in Compostela de Santiago.5 6 We toured the Cathedral, visited the tomb of St. James, and, following tradition, embraced the statue of St. James above. After the wonder of being at the grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes, to visit the resting place of one of Jesus' disciples and martyrs was also a tremendous blessing.

After an overnight stay in Coimbra, Portugal, we made our way to Fatima, where we spent 2 nights. In 1916, three young shepherd children, siblings Francisco and Jacinta and their cousin Lucia, were visited by an angel up on the hills near the village of Fatima. Later, on May 13, 1917, the children were visited by a lady in white carrying a rosary. She urged them to pray the rosary every day to bring peace to the world and end the war. After word spread of what the children were seeing, seventy thousand people joined the children for the last appearance of the Lady. The sun miraculously danced in the sky for all to see, an event that made newspaper headlines. The Lady revealed herself to Lucia as The Lady of the Rosary. A shrine and sanctuary were built in Fatima in honor of Our Lady and it hosts thousands of visitors year round. Saints Jacinta and Francisco are buried there and passed away shortly after the apparitions. 7

It is amazing to consider that Mary appeared in Lourdes and Fatima to young children in a span of sixty years.9 Miracles continue at these sites to this day. In fact, we learned that a teenaged girl from Spain had her vision restored in a miracle at Fatima a few days after our visit.10

On August 1, we arrived in Lisbon, where we went to the opening Mass in Eduardo VII Park with a fabulous view to the Tagus River just before it spills into the Atlantic. A large crowd of Priests, Bishops, and Cardinals all dressed in white from all over the world joined Cardinal Manuel Clemente in celebrating the Mass with thousands of Catholics from every nation in attendance.

Each morning, we attended Rise Up sessions hosted by a diocese from the US. These took place beautiful old churches found all over Lisbon. The youth were invited to participate, sharing their testimonies, struggles, and joys in small groups. Some of our group shared openly with all in attendance. What an inspiration it was to hear their heartfelt stories and sincere messages of faith. The bishops gave encouraging talks at Rise Up as well. Daily at noon, the bishops and many priests, celebrated Mass for us. At our last Rise Up session, forty priests heard confessions. It was comforting to experience God's grace of forgiveness and see so many young people receiving and being renewed by it in this setting, from Dioceses all over the US.

A highlight of our experience in Lisbon was joining ten thousand people to hear Bishop Barron speak in one of Lisbon's green parks. More than thirty US Bishops introduced themselves before the talk including Bishop Jacques. Bishop Barron inspired us all recounting how Jesus walked with disciples on the Road to Emmaus after his resurrection. "Let Christ come to life in you, set your heart on fire, and then you'll know who you are. Through your mission, you will find joy and transfigure the world." 11

Pope Francis arrived in Lisbon on August 3, and we were excited to see him in person on the stage in Eduardo VII Park where we had previously attended opening mass. The Pope shared, "You are not here by accident. The Lord has called you. Indeed, He has called you by name!" 12

"The illusions of social media attract us and promise happiness but later show themselves to be vain, superfluous things, substitutes that leave us empty inside," the pope said. "Jesus is not like that; he believes in you, in each one of you and us, because to him each one of us is important. Jesus calls us as we are, not as we would like to be." A few of us got close enough for a friendly wave from the Pope as he departed that evening in a motorcade.

We refer to our next to last night in Lisbon as "The Pilgrimage within a Pilgrimage". We journeyed in 100-degree temperatures on a packed metro and hiked out to the waterfront with our backpacks on and sleeping bags in tow for a few hours in order to participate in a vigil, sleep outdoors, and be present for the final Mass of WYD. We slept on a rocky sandy beach with dust swirling about us alongside one and a half million of our closest friends of all nations. It was a sacrifice that I think we all appreciated. In the morning, we were delighted to see Pope Francis escorted down the road near our section. He was joined by ten thousand priests and seven hundred bishops in celebrating Mass. The Pope told us to "shine" and to "listen". "Do not be afraid. The Church and the world needs young people like the earth needs rain." 13

It was deeply moving to walk the hills where the children were visited by Our Lady. Bishop Jacques led us in the Fatima Prayer at a statue of Our Lady marking the location of her appearance.8 Later, we joined people from many countries and states for mass with Cardinal O'Malley at the Sanctuary. Bishop Jacques and many other clergy concelebrated the mass delivered in several languages. Some of our youth prayed the kneeling rosary on a long marble path. We visited the tombs of Jacinta and Francisco. That night we attended a candlelight vigil where the rosary was said in ten languages and we sang hymns to Mary as we processed with fellow Christians from all over the world, a truly Catholic (Universal) moment.

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On our last night in Portugal, we were overwhelmed and filled with joy from the graces we had received and the wonders we had witnessed on this trip that truly expanded our minds and hearts. We come home from this great pilgrimage realizing that the Church is universal. Even in this difficult and divisive time in the world, the Church stands strong, embodied by new and faithful young believers who are hungry for the gospel and ready to take up the Cross of Christ.

There are pilgrimages all around us that can renew our spirit and call us to deeper conversion in the faith. Whenever we visit a parish on the other side of the state named for a saint we know little about, we are on a pilgrimage. Or when we visit nearby holy places, like Mepkin Abbey in Moncks Corner or The Shrine of Our Lady of Blessed Hope in Kingstree, we are on a pilgrimage. We can even venture farther to other states or countries, where there are numerous places of pilgrimage to visit that can enhance our spiritual journey, like The National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington D.C., or St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal, or The Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. Where will your next pilgrimage lead you?



Evangelization

Padre Pio Prayer Group

The Padre Pio Prayer Group meets the first Friday of every month in Classroom #3 in the Parish Life Center after Mass & Adoration (around 9:30), except on holiday weekends. 













