

## Let's Build an Empire of Hope

If you can see the new movie, CABRINI, on the big screen or at home, please take the time to watch. The movie portrays its chief protagonist, the mission driven Italian Catholic nun, with passion, purpose and sensitivity. The viewer quickly realizes that Mother Cabrini is a powerful force that God has placed in our world to do good and to grow His Kingdom. The movie starts in Lombardi, Italy with Mother Cabrini amid a modest community of nuns receiving a personal letter from the Holy See to come and meet with the powerful and the mighty of the Catholic

Church. She takes a train, together with her passionate desire to start a mission in China, across Italy and is received by a perturbed Cardinal in Rome who unabashedly and swiftly rejects her twelfth request to bring a mission to China. Undeterred, Cabrini (experiencing a flashback to her childhood near drowning experience, surviving, and fighting chronic illness the rest of her life) announces to the Cardinal that she will see the Pope! Pope Leo XIII is more sympathetic to this impassioned nun. He hands her a box of personal letters from Italian immigrants who were treated so poorly and abandoned in New York. He says to her "Go West not East".

Mother and her sisters arrive in New York and face one obstacle after another. They are first shocked by the slums and destitute conditions that the Italian immigrants are forced to live in the infamous ghetto of Five Points. The archbishop of New York offers them a tepid reception, the mayor outright wrath. A sympathetic reporter from the New York Times follows Mother to the slums and then reports a front-page article to the plethora of Times readers, "Rats have it better".

Sympathy and money started to flow and before too long, the orphanage at Five Points was outgrown and another property abandoned by the Jesuits along the Hudson River was purchased and restored.

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Mother's humble but uncompromising spirit sought to bring dignity, faith, education, health services and opportunity to all immigrants living in New York, not just Italians. Her vocation to be a voice for the voiceless engaged active and unrelenting sparring with mayors, archbishops, cardinals and popes, even a session with the Italian Senate in Rome... all from this frail soul who almost drowned in her youth!

Mother Cabrini envisioned, with God's grace, creating an **Empire of Hope**. During her lifetime she did. As a saint she continues. May she intercede for us so that we too can be missionaries of hope in this modern world which too closely mirrors the agony, poverty and hopelessness of 1880 Five Points. (Continued...)

#### WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE MINISTRY FOR WHICH YOU VOLUNTEER?



**Evangelization**

**Discernment**

*“The ability to judge well.*

*In Christian contexts perception in the absence of judgment with a view to obtaining spiritual guidance and understanding.”*

Now more than ever we need the ability to discern well. It is a skill honed over a lifetime and requires time and effort and a trusted guide to navigate.

Every day we are faced with competing priorities, loud and differing voices, and opinions that pull us in opposite directions. As we enter another political season, we are faced with a cacophony of voices clamoring for one side or another. It is unsettling hearing these competing and differing viewpoints, how is one to find peace amidst all this noise? How are we, as Christians, called to respond to these differing tumultuous voices and do so charitably?

In our Catholic Faith we have the sacrament of reconciliation, an opportunity to humbly approach God through self-reflection and the gentle ear of a trusted priest. This provides an opportunity for us to “name, claim, and tame” our concupiscence in whatever form that takes. Pride is the root of all sin and often our opinion clashes with others which can result in sin. Thank God and His Holy Catholic Church for offering this sacrament to get us on a better path!

When we utilize the sacrament of reconciliation regularly and consistently, ideally with the same confessor, we develop an opportunity for deeper conversion and life-altering change for the better. When we see the same priest, he can provide perspective and reminders of the patterns he may see present and offer guidance for us to move forward.

Confession, if time permits, can turn into spiritual direction. Our parish priests are very busy and may not have the time to offer this to us. Setting an appointment is desirable if spiritual direction is needed beyond the standard confession time. We are fortunate at our parish to have Kathy Adams and Deacon Mike Appel who are certified in spiritual direction. They too can journey with us on a consistent (monthly or quarterly as needed) basis, providing therapy for our soul... To keep a spiritual journal with life’s ups and downs and challenges and to review this with a trusted guide is very helpful if we want to glean insights and awareness into how and why things are happening in our life. And to ask what is God inviting me to consider in all this?

St. Ignatius of Loyola (+ 1556) brought the spiritual exercises to the fore during his time on earth. There are retreats of varying lengths of time to experience the beauty and value in Loyola’s exercises ranging from a weekend to a week to thirty days or more. There are also many books on the subject. Taking the time to be aware of how we react to circumstances and our response is crucial to understanding how the Spirit is working in our lives and if we are indeed cooperating or

resisting God's will in the process.

Loyola, was the founder of the Jesuit order. Jesuits are known to be contemplatives in action. They are required to make a daily examination of "consciousness". One format for doing this is abbreviated to **LT3F**. This may be a practice we wish to add to our daily spiritual exercises.

**L** = Pray for Light (invite the Holy Spirit's guidance as you reflect on the events of the day)

**T** = Offer Thanks (for specific events of the day)

**F** = Review our Feelings (what emotions did we feel at three events of the day)

**F** = Focus on one feeling (which one feeling is strongest after reviewing them all)

**F** = Future (ask for God's accompaniment and presence for the new day ahead or next day)

Occasionally this examination of consciousness will result in an examination of "conscience" which then may lead to the need for the sacrament of reconciliation. Introducing this review into our daily routine brings the process of discernment into focus in a practical way.

A Trappist Monk told a group of our parish men visiting Mepkin Abbey, "pay attention to the resistance". When we hesitate or respond in a slow or cautious manner it is likely the Holy Spirit guiding us to some deeper understanding. Fr. Pat simplifies this by saying, "sometimes God says no... slow... or go. This begs the question; how do we know if it is the voice of God nudging our hearts and how should we reflect and respond?"

When we experience desolation, dryness, anxiety, and despair, ask ourselves, whose voice is that? When we experience the fruits of the Spirit: charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, fidelity, modesty, self-control, and chastity these are excellent indicators that we are cooperating with and are in God's will in our circumstance.

To pay attention to the movement of the Holy Spirit in ours and other lives is to be living in the Spirit. This is a means to experience and share the grace of God with ourselves and others. We must slow down, be aware, and make time to listen for the still small voice of God to experience this grace. Over time, and with practice, one will receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, piety, and fear of the Lord. To be able to see with the eyes of the soul and listen with the ear of the heart is to be charitable (and god like) toward others. It is humbling to recall that we are to be as patient with others as God has been with us. This approach and attitude is inspiring and efficacious and draws people to us and we then can share the reason for our joy which is evangelization!

St. Ignatius of Loyola, St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, Servant of God Elisabeth Leseur, and Thomas Merton are deeply prayerful Catholic mystics who have written richly about walking closely with God and being guided by the Holy Spirit. May this encourage us to learn more and reach out for spiritual direction. It is well worth the time and effort.

Birthright is an all-volunteer organization of many people who dedicate their time and effort to continue our mission as an outreach and resource center for pregnant women, foster parents, and guardians. We support our mothers, at a minimum, throughout their pregnancies and until the baby turns 1 year of age. This basic time period can vary based upon health issues.

Along with a regular distribution of diapers, wipes, and baby clothing, we also provide our clients the opportunity to achieve additional education and work level skills with specified financial assistance during their time with us. With proper documentation and registration our clients can remain with us for an additional year and pursue their desired education goal. We understand the important task of returning young moms to diploma, GED, college, or certificate programs to take our clients from dependency to independence.

The various donations from members of the PBOC, both financial and material, combined with other sources of funding, enable Birthright to continue to provide support for mothers and their babies that live in Georgetown County and neighboring communities. Specifically, the PBOC Women's Club has a generous Birthright spring baby shower, the Knights of Columbus routinely provide support, parishioners volunteer at our Center in Georgetown, others knit items for our new babies, and baby items are anonymously left on the director's porch bench.

The recent PBOC 'Stuff the Bus' event hosted by the Knights of Columbus and Gloria Dausch with the Respect Life Committee garnered diapers, wipes, and baby clothing to include generous financial donations from PBOC parishioners. We are so thankful for all those who contributed to this successful campaign, and we are thankful to all who have generously contributed to Birthright in the past in so many ways.




**Pawleys Island Council 11028 Donates \$1000 to Temple Beth Elohim**

It was brought to the attention of the Pawleys Island Council Number 11028 that a synagogue in Georgetown, SC has a cemetery that requires repair. A donation was needed to go towards the cost of improving the brick-and-mortar foundation, repairing iron fence, and extending it, and restoring the gate.

Temple Beth Elohim Cemetery was founded in 1772 in Georgetown, South Carolina. The building is at the corner of Screven Street and Highmarket Street, but the cemetery is at Broad Street and Duke Street.

Georgetown is the third oldest city in the U.S., in the state of South Carolina and the county seat of Georgetown County, in the Lowcountry. Located on Winyah Bay at the confluence of the Black, Great Pee Dee, Waccamaw, and Sampit rivers, Georgetown is the second largest seaport in South Carolina, handling over 960,000 tons of materials a year, while Charleston is the largest. Beginning in the colonial era, Georgetown was the commercial center of an indigo- and rice-producing area. Rice replaced indigo as the chief commodity crop in the antebellum area. Later the timber industry became important here.

Jews arrived in the historic seaport of Georgetown, S.C. in the mid-1700s. It is the second oldest Jewish burial site in the state. It contains the graves of three of Georgetown's six Jewish mayors. One of the mayors greeted President George Washington on his 1791 Southern Tour. Before the beginning of the 20th century, there had been 5 Jewish intendants – or mayors – of the city: Solomon Cohen, Abraham Myers, Aaron Lopez, Solomon Cohen, Jr., and Louis Erlich. In the recent 20th century, Sylvan Rosen was the 6th Jewish mayor of Georgetown.


Services are held every Friday night with 20-30 in attendance. There is a full Torah service every Friday Night and an Oneg (social function) after services on the 2nd and 4th Fridays of the month (except June, July, and August). Much work has been done on the buildings and grounds, and to the interior.

Council member Robbie Crompton met with Andy Friedman, a representative of the Temple, who explained the financial need. Crompton reported back to the Council and requested a consideration to make a donation. On January 19, 2024, Crompton and his wife attended the Friday night services and presented the \$1000 check to the Rabbi Scott Weiner. The congregation was surprised and delighted. Crompton said in his remarks that one of the pillars of the Knights was “community.” Because this Temple's members have played such an important part in the history of Georgetown, it satisfies that commitment. Crompton and his wife were very well received and enjoyed the fellowship of the members of the Temple.
