

Dear Parishioners,

While on pilgrimage to Greece and Turkey in May of this year, I received a call on the biblical Island of Patmos from Fr. Gary Linski, Vicar for Priests. He called me on behalf of the bishop to request that I become the dean for the Myrtle Beach Deanery. Fr. Ed Fitzgerald, the former dean, was going on sabbatical and the bishop needed a replacement and was asking me. I said yes.

What did I say yes to you might ask? Well, according to canon law, the bishop of a diocese has the ability to divide his diocese into districts or deaneries. The Diocese of Charleston which comprises the entire state of South Carolina consists of the following seven deaneries: Aiken,

Beaufort, Charleston, Columbia, Greenville, Myrtle Beach and Rock Hill. As dean of Myrtle Beach Deanery, there are twelve parishes and missions and twenty priests active and retired. As dean, I will act as a liaison between the bishop and the priests of this region. This position will embrace: the calling of regular deanery meetings; trying to ensure that priests are happy, healthy and holy; reaching out to ill, troubled or dying priests and assisting them in their care; having visits with the clergy in their parishes; ensuring that sacramental records are kept up to date; ensuring that when a priest moves, the patrimony of the church is safeguarded in the time of a transfer; and if a priest dies, to make sure that the deceased priest be properly prepared for our Catholic Funeral Rites and that these rites are executed with the gratitude, prayerfulness and dignity rightfully due to a child of God and priest of Jesus Christ. At the bishop's pleasure, the dean can also be called upon to install a new pastor in his new parish as well as officiate at the Sacrament of Confirmation.

With the office of dean, comes the honorary title, Very Reverend before the priest's name and Vicar

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Forane (VF) afterwards. Dean has its early origins in the Roman world whereby its designation was first given to a military official in charge of ten soldiers. Later in the Middle Ages, the term dean was used in monastic communities to denote the leader of ten monks. Normally as the bishop would exercise his authority in an urban area, his Vicar Forane would exercise limited authority in the rural areas (forane) of the diocese, and this tradition continues in our Catholic Church to this day. Please know that my primary role will remain being your pastor, which I am so thankful to God, the bishop and you, the wonderful and faithful people and parishioners of Precious Blood of Christ Parish. Birthright of Georgetown


Our all-volunteer organization consists of people who dedicate their time and effort to provide continuous material support, additional community resources, and mentoring for pregnant women, foster parents, and guardians. We support our mothers, at a minimum, throughout their pregnancies and until the baby turns 1 year of age. This support time can vary based upon the health issues of the babies and if the mother is enrolled in education.

We currently provide material assistance for approximately 200 mothers and their babies. We provide an additional year of Birthright support and financial assistance for those clients who wish to pursue education opportunities such as a High School diploma, GED, college, or certification programs that take our clients from dependency to independence. Currently we have approximately 55 clients that are enrolled in various levels of education.

Since Birthright's inception over 20 years ago we have served over 4,000 mothers, to include foster parents and guardians by supplying them with diapers, wipes, and baby clothing for their babies. Many of those clients took advantage of pursuing education opportunities with our assistance.



Thus far this year we have had 4 mothers who made the decision to save the life of their babies,





Generous individuals, churches, church organizations, community groups, and anonymous donors continue to give Birthright material and financial support, which enables us to continue to distribute diapers, wipes, and baby clothing as well as many hand-knitted and hand-sewn baby items and personal care products for the mother.

We are forever grateful to ALL who give their TIME, TALENT, and TREASURE to allow us to continue to help those who face unfortunate and sometimes daunting circumstances.

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE MINISTRY FOR WHICH YOU VOLUNTEER?

The purpose of the Ministry is to provide members of our Precious Blood Community, who have experienced a loss of a loved one, be it a spouse, child, parent, sibling or friend, with "listening ears" to provide help in any way and a heart full of compassion and understanding as they navigate one of life's most difficult experiences.

WHAT DO YOU LIKE ABOUT BEING PART OF THIS MINISTRY?

Our family values throughout our lives have been to look for ways to help others in need. Listening and understanding someone's needs at a most difficult time and having the ability to make a difference is a very rewarding part of this ministry for us. We believe people gain much hope when they know they are not experiencing something alone. That is where we find fulfillment in our involvement with this ministry.

TELL US ABOUT WHAT YOU DO FOR THIS MINISTRY?

Our ministry involves contact with the bereaved parishioners during the first year following their loss. In addition to phone calls, a mailing, including a small book about coping with grief, is sent to each survivor at 4 intervals during that first year. Each book is written to emphasize the thoughts, emotions and feelings that may be emerging at that particular time. The mailing also includes a personally addressed and signed letter from Fr. Paul. Our parish also partners with Tidelands Hospital System, providing a PLC Classroom for bi-monthly bereavement group sessions outreach program. These sessions are led by a trained professional. An invitation to attend the group sessions is included in our phone calls to the bereaved and the letter from Fr. Paul.

TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF:

Sue: My husband, Bob, and I have been permanent Murrells Inlet residents and Precious Blood parishioners for 13 years. In addition to the bereavement ministry, I bring Communion to the homebound, volunteer at Birthright and participate in the We Adore Him adoration program.

Michelle: My husband, Ken, and I have been members of Precious Blood since we relocated from Iowa 8 years ago. In my Iowa Catholic parish, I went through a lengthy training process to become a Stephen Minister which involved Bereavement support through the "Journey through Grief" process which is a very well laid out program for someone who has lost a loved one. In addition, we were trained to support and provide a helping hand component for members of our parish who had asked for help having been diagnosed with a terminal illness, loss of a job, as well as needing support with family issues they were facing - this requires several months of training. I was thrilled that Father Paul had the insight to see the value of adding "Journey through Grief" to the existing Bereavement Team and sincerely appreciate his ongoing support along with support from our office - Ellen and Patty - and my committee partner, Sue Fix. We all work very well as one team

for the benefit of our parishioners. My husband and I also support the various "food outreach" programs in our church community.
